Ring Returned to Owner

Pete McGhee of Northland Jewelry Recoveries recently had a call from Peria resident Ray Woolf, who had lost a ring while gathering Tuatua on Tokerau Beach. Pete has been metal detecting for over 35 years. In that time he has found and returned many hundreds of lost items to people. Rings, bracelets, phones, keys... most of whom had given up ever seeing their precious item again.

Below is the story that Pete recently shared of his search for the wayward ring:

'On New Years Day, Ray was on Tokerau Beach engaging in that iconic Kiwi summer pursuit, digging in the sand for Tuatua. Regrettably, his sentimental gold and diamond ring did what so many other lost rings have done while gathering these tasty shellfish; it slipped from his finger into the sand, and vanished.

A week later he left me a phone message asking if I was able to assist in finding his lost ring. I arranged to meet him the coming weekend and see if I could get his ring back to him.

That's when nature intervened with a double whammy in the form of Cyclone Cody pumping waves up to 5+ metres onto the coast.

Then one from left-field; the eruption of Hunga Tonga–Hunga Ha'apai (which I heard in New Zealand, some 2,400km away!) which sent tsunami surges out across the entire Pacific.

.... I decided to reschedule the ring recovery for the following weekend! There was real potential for substantial sand movement with these combined events, but my safety always comes first.

The appointed morning arrived and I thank Ray for making the effort to meet me on site at dawn in order to catch the low tide. While he referred to photos taken on the day to sort out where he had been, I got kitted up to get wet.

I set up a 'beat' of around 60m width to try and allow for any positional errors in Ray's recollection, and waded out into the break. While the sea was calm for this surf-beach, the storm had brought in tonnes of loose weed which instantly wrapped around the detector, adding massive drag. It wasn't practical to keep lifting the coil out of the water every few seconds to shake it off, so I had to put up with it. It felt like I was mopping the ocean floor and had to change arms every few minutes.

Added entertainment was the water being infested by loads of Eagle Rays feeding on Tuatua in the turbid water. When I got too close, or accidentally clipped them with the coil, they would take off through the wash like jet fighters. I love these guys, but having to do the 'Stingray Shuffle' through the weed was really fatiguing...

I had completed about three or four sweeps across the search area when the detector sounded off on a faint target. There had been no trash for once, so in my mind this was going to be the ring. The hole went deeper and deeper, only to reveal an old lead fishing weight! I shook a basketball-sized lump of weed off the coil and continued on, disappointed.

15 minutes later, another quiet tone in the headphones could be heard over the waves and wind. Quiet, but crisp. The scoop went in, missed it, another bite went deep into the bottom of the hole. Check, and the sand was quiet. Whatever it was, was in the scoop.

As I shook the sand and shell out through the scoop I heard that familiar clatter of a ring. I secured it and slogged ashore through the weed and rays.


The following sequence of reactions, I have seen many times. Initially there is resignation in their eyes as they saw me walking up the beach after apparently giving up, changing to disbelief when I removed the ring from inside my glove, then amazement that the ring had actually been found, and was back on Rays finger.

Some detectorists collect rings, I prefer to collect smiles.'

Process for Accessing CCTV Footage:

- 1. Lodge an incident report with the Police on the Crime Reporting Line: 105
- 2. Send an email to cctvkarikari@gmail.com or contact Northland CCTV 09 407 8788 with the following information:
- Your name
- Address
- Incident number (from Police)
- Your contact details
- Incident date and approx timeframes

- Brief explanation of incident and what you want them to look for.
- 3. The CCTV monitoring team (Based at Kaitaia Police Station), will respond to your query and begin the search. This may take up to 3-4 business days due to workload
- 4. The CCTV Team will respond with outcomes and if applicable will provide footage/images to police to accompany the file. Footage will be provided on a case-by-case basis. The Team must adhere to privacy policies and procedures and must ensure all information is provided in the strictest of confidence.

What's up there?

This is a great time of year to investigate the night sky and learn more about the constellations, planets and stars that inhabit it. Take a blanket and the kids, and spend some time lying out under the stars and see what you can identify.

There are a number of websites, and Facebook pages, that can help with learning more about the night sky. Check out Facebook page Far North Sky - they advise on any unique happenings such as visibility of the International Space Station or the Starlink Satellites and have a monthly article full of information about what people can expect to see here in the Far North.

The Royal Astronomical Society of New Zealand has full and detailed information to guide you in deciphering the stars above. Have a look at their website for downloadable maps etc; www.rasnz.org.nz


The Stardome page also provides monthly charts for night sky exploring. Go to www.stardome.org.nz to see these and guidance on how to use them.

5 at 10 p.m. Evening sky in February 2022

To use the chart, hold it up to the sky. Turn the chart so the direction you are looking is at the bottom of the chart. If you are looking to the south then have 'South horizon' at the lower edge. As the earth turns the sky appears to rotate clockwise around the south celestial pole (SCP on the chart). Stars rise in the east and set in the west, just like the sun. The sky makes a small extra westward shift each night as we orbit the sun.

At the beginning of the month Jupiter might be seen setting due west an hour after the Sun. Sirius, the brightest star, appears north of overhead at dusk. Canopus, the second brightest star, is south of the zenith. Orion, containing 'The Pot', is midway up the north sky. Below and left of Orion are Taurus and the Pleiades/Matariki star cluster. The Southern Cross and Pointers are midway up the southeast sky. The Clouds of Magellan, LMC and SMC, two nearby galaxies, are high in the south sky. From northern Aotearoa the bright star Capella is near the north horizon. (In the eastern dawn sky is brilliant Venus with Mars and Mercury nearby.)

Seaweed Tea for the Garden

Seaweed is rich in trace elements and potassium, which makes it ideal to add to compost in its raw state, to work in as a mulch, or to create a liquid fertiliser. This is really easy to do and your plants will be thankful for it; seaweed fertiliser releases about 60 nutrients that plants can benefit from.

- 1. Gather seaweed and give it a quick rinse.
- 2. Fill a bucket or barrel 3/4 with water. Add as much seaweed as will fit and leave to soak.
- 3. Stir the seaweed mix every few days.
- 4. Allow to soak for several months—it is ready to use when there is no smell of ammonia.
- 5. When it is ready dilute three parts water to one of seaweed tea. Use as needed on your plants and watch them jump for joy.


