### Whats the deal with Internet?

Karikari Panui

Part of my role is overseeing a small corporate ISP (Internet Service Provider) so I thought I would share some inside info on ISP services available here. So I am going to do my very best to break this down as simply as I can. I may need to do a couple of followup articles to cover off some of this in more detail. To get the ball rolling here is a list from best, to worst internet (this can be subjective):

- 1. Fibre
- 2. Really Good VDSL
- 3. Starlink (low orbit satellite)
- 4. Good VDSL
- 5. Cellular Fixed Wireless
- 6. WISP (Wireless ISP like Uber)
- 7. Traditional Satellite (fixed orbit)
- 8. Bad VDSL
- 9. ADSL
- 10. Dial-up

Fibre – Fibre is fantastic. If you can get fibre and can afford it there is nothing better. The fibre to your house is provided by Chorus and the actual internet service can be provided by pretty much any ISP and it really doesn't matter. For most home connections any provider will do. Now, one key detail is explaining is the relationship between Chorus and your ISP. As the Government has funded the installation of the fibre in the streets, the fibre provider sells the monthly fibre access to your ISP at a fixed price which doesn't leave much for your ISP to make as profit. What this means to you as a consumer is your ISP may try to convince you that Cellular Fixed wireless is better.

This is quite common with both Spark and One who have cellular networks. For the majority of consumers, especially those

These are all options that are available to us on the Peninsular and to most of Northland. Ok so that's the raw connection technology, what about the 'provider' or ISP / Internet Service Provider? Again, this really depends, and we may need to go into further detail in subsequent articles if there is interest. Mostly the technology is the important part and the provider is more around support and value




wanting to stream TV, this is a major step backwards and a trap to avoid! The downside of fibre is the installation is a bit complex and there is usually quite a wait. The 'fibre' that has been in the streets is actually micro duct which is tiny tubes / straws. When Chorus come to connect a property they then need to connect the tube all the way to the outside of your house. If you have a batch and cannot coordinate with Chorus, we may be able to help in exchange for a donation to the Community Hall. Reach out via email and if we can help we will contact@karikaripanui.nz— The solid lines show where fibre runs and the green dots show where fibre is available

Really Good VDSL – If you are really close to a VDSL cabinet and can get speeds over 100Mbit then this can be a good option especially if Fibre is not available. As this relies on the copper network it can be subject to issues with water ingress during winter. Again the ISP doesn't really matter.

Starlink – There is so much hype around Starlink. I have seen people with perfectly good fibre connections replace them with Starlink so they can pay more for a worse service! Don't get sucked into the hype. Starlink is very good and if you don't have access to Fibre is it probably your best option. It is worth understanding that even if you buy your Starlink from Noel Leemings you will not get any local support. The support is all via support ticket and can often take weeks to resolve. It is important to factor this into your decision making. Starlink uses a network of 6,078 (as of May 2024) low earth orbit satellites. These can be thought of a bit like space mirrors bouncing the signal from your house to the landing station in Puwera or Te Hana, so if there is a major event cutting off these NZ landing stations your Starlink will disconnect. Starlink also has quite a high power draw which isn't an issue if you are on mains, but if you are on a solar / off grid setup it might not be right for you. Otherwise if you can't get fibre, Starlink is probably going to be the best option for you.

Cellular Fixed Wireless – Isn't fixed wireless a bit of a conflicting name? Ok the deal is, the service is just like mobile data on your cellphone except when it is delivered as fixed wireless it's tied to an address. Different providers handle if you break the rules and move it differently. Modern 3G / 4G / 5G cellular coverage 'breaths' in and out, this means the more people who are using it, the less the coverage travels out from the tower. If you are towards the fringe, you may notice this especially during the summer where both your fixed wireless and mobile turns to rubbish.

Currently on the Peninsular we have two locations; the Spark tower by the tip (which is also licensed / used by One) and then 2 Degrees and One both have towers up on the ridge. While Spark seems to have the better network, One has better coverage here, especially if you're out on the Peninsular past Carrington's. (Map over page shows the sites)



WISP – A WISP is a Wireless ISP delivering service from local wireless stations to a dish on your roof. We do get coverage from a few local WISP's including Uber and if customer service is high on your list these guys have a pretty good reputation and they will come out and do all the install for you. They are not as quick as Starlink or Fixed Wireless (on a good day), but they are worth considering if supporting local is a priority for you.

**Traditional Satellite** – This is legacy fixed orbit satellite service. These days there are many better options in our neck of the woods. If anyone offers you a traditional satellite service make sure you can try it before you are committed to any sort of term. Despite good speeds advertised, this will feel incredibly slow as the signal has a round trip distance of 140,000 kms, yep, from your house to space back down to the ground station back to space, back to your house. Due to the physics of this you will find the connection feeling very, very slow.

**ADSL** / **Dialup** – Just avoid these options like VDSL, these use the legacy copper network which is being decommissioned over time.

# Who Named Doubtless Bay?

According to LINZ: On 9 December 1769, the HMB Endeavour sailed past a bay near the top of the North Island. Cook named it 'Doubtless Bay', without giving any reasons for doing so. Because of the wind direction, they could not enter the bay and could only just see its end. After passing the bay, the Endeavour headed north and rounded North Cape (Otou) and Cape Reinga / Te Rerenga Wairua in a storm.



Community law provides free legal services thought New Zealand <u>Taitokerau</u> - <u>Community Law</u>

### Law Corner

Wills don't have to be complicated. But to be valid there are some legal requirements.


- 1. To meet the requirements of the Wills Act 2007 a will must be:
- in writing
- signed by the will-maker or a person directed to sign the will in the will-maker's presence
- witnessed by two people who are present at the same time and who sign the will in the presence of the willmaker
- 2. A video will is not valid.
- 3. In certain circumstances the transcript of a video will can be validated as a will (as can other defective wills or will instructions). This will require an application to the High Court.
- 4. If you get married or enter into a civil union after making a will, unless your will was made in contemplation of that marriage or civil union, your will is revoked.
- 5. If you die without a will and you have a spouse or partner, and children, your estate will be divided between your spouse or partner and children in accordance with the Administration Act.

Vicki Ammundsen can answer any other will questions you have at the Koha Legal Clinic that is held on the first Saturday of each month (apart from January) in the Hall Library. ### Freezer fish

This simple fish gratin serves 4 to 6 people is the perfect recipe for those vacuum packs of fish that you find lurking at the back of the freezer. Even better, if there are any leftovers, you can freeze those to eat later in the week. This fish gratin can be served by itself or paired with beans or a head of broccoli cut into florets and boiled in salted water until just cooked. If you don't have all (or any) of the herbs and spices don't worry. The recipe will still be lovely.

#### Ingredients

- 3 T oil
- 1 onion sliced or diced
- 1 large or 2 small leeks, trimmed, sliced and washed
- 3 cloves of garlic
- 1 tsp coriander seeds gently crushed
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp pepper
- 150ml white wine, fish stock or water
- 2 x 400g cans chopped tomatoes
- 2 T tomato paste
- ½ tsp saffron
- 1 bay leaf
- Juice of 1 lemon
- 1 handful of parsley roughly chopped
- 2 medium fish fillets (700 to 900g) cut into 5 to 6 pieces each
- 75g grated cheese
- 50g dried breadcrumbs

#### Preparation

- 1. Put the oven on to heat up to 220°C.
- 2. Crush the garlic.
- 3. Heat the oil in a medium or large pot.
- 4. Add the onion, leek, garlic and coriander and cook on a medium heat until the leek and onion are soft and lightly browned.
- 5. Add the salt, pepper, wine / stock/ water, the tomatoes, tomato paste, saffron and bay leaf.
- 6. Simmer for about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- 7. Add the lemon juice, <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of the parsley and stir.
- 8. Pour about a quarter of the sauce into a baking dish, add the fish and pour the rest of the sauce over the fish.
- 9. Bake in the oven until the fish is just cooked (about 15 minutes)
- 10. While the fish is cooking mix the grated cheese, remaining parsley and breadcrumbs together.
- 11. When the fish is cooked, sprinkle the cheese and crumb mix over the top and put back in the oven until golden brown and bubbling.

Serve and eat!

The koha will be used to help fund the Karikari Community Hall.



Your name, Address, Incident number (from Police), Your contact details Incident date and approx. timeframes, Brief


explanation of incident and what you want them to look for. 3. The CCTV monitoring team will respond to your query and begin the search.

This may take up to 3-4 business days due to workload.

4. The CCTV Team will respond with outcomes and if applicable will provide footage/images to police to accompany the file. Footage will be provided on a case-by-case basis. The Team must adhere to privacy policies and procedures and must ensure all information is provided in the strictest of confidence.




